

NEW AMERICAN MANDOLIN ENSEMBLE was formed in 2013 to promote new compositions for plucked string instruments by living U.S. composers and to represent American classical mandolin activity at festivals worldwide. Several pieces have been dedicated to them by composers including Thomas Schuttenheim, James Kellaris and Frank Wallace. Owen Hartford wrote Carousel I and Carousel II with NAME in mind. Today's performance of them is their world premiere.

PROVIDENCE MANDOLIN ORCHESTRA was founded in 1911 by William Place Jr., one of the great virtuosos of the mandolin's "Golden Age" of the early Twentieth Century. Its current version dates back to 1971, when it was revived by Hibbard Perry. A student of Perry's, Mark Davis, has been the PMO's director since 1989; and the PMO is now one of this country's leading plucked string orchestras, has performed around the U.S. and Europe, and has collaborated with ensembles from several countries. The PMO has the fortune to claim Owen Hartford as its resident composer for many years, with Hartford contributing greatly to the PMO's repertoire.
