Program Notes (by Robert Margo). The Gunsenheimer *Concertino* is one of the classics of the modern German canon for "zupforchester" (plucked string orchestra). Manente's *Rêverie* is a characteristic tremolo work from the Italian Golden Age of the mandolin in the early twentieth century. James Kellaris is one of the today's leading composers for plucked strings (and, in his "day" job, the James S. Womack/Gemini Corporation Professor of Signage and Visual Marketing at the University of Cincinnati). His latest work, *Au Café Cardamome*, which the PMO premiered this past March, features extended techniques and extensive use of Greek melodies, rhythms, and harmonies. Olof Näslund's lovely trio is inspired by minimalism; the second mandolin part is played here on mandola in G (octave mandolin). Unquestionably one of America's greatest songwriters, Randy Newman's words and music plumb the full range of human behavior, along with controversial social and political topics, in unabashedly satirical and ironic terms. *Sail Away* is from the 1972 album of the same title and *In Germany* and *Baltimore* are from 1977's *Little Criminals*. The PMO performs the first and second movements of Berklee School of Music composer Francine Trester's remarkable *Three Movements for* 

Mandolin Orchestra, commissioned for the group in 2006 by Robert Margo. An award-winning composer and prominent recorder soloist, Jamie Allen is the Senior Director of Operations and Growth for the Rhode Island Philharmonic Orchestra & Music School. Written for the PMO and tonight receiving its world premiere, Allen's *Providence Raptors* is inspired by urban wildlife photographer Peter Green's book of the same title.

The original **Providence Mandolin Orchestra** was founded in 1911 by William Place Jr, one of the leading players of the era. The modern version of the PMO dates from the early 1970s, when it was revived by Hibbard Perry, a former student of Place's. Since then, the PMO has become one of the leading American mandolin ensembles with regular performances throughout the eastern United States and Western Europe. The PMO's music director since 1989, **Mark Davis** began his guitar and mandolin studies with Hibbard Perry in Rhode Island and continued his musical training with the eminent German guitarist Siegfried Behrend. Davis has performed widely in the United States and abroad and has made numerous recordings.
